Attendance

Attendance affects attainment

Students who attended over 95% of the time last year scored on average a full grade higher than those between 90% and 95%

Students with attendance between 80% and 90% scored nearly 2 grades lower on average

Below 80% was nearly 4 grades lower




Typical Forgetting Curve for Newly Learned Information

Students First UTWOOD Why do we need your help?

Evidence shows that parental support is **eight times** more important in determining a child's academic success than other factors.

The work ethic and culture that you instil in your child at home can make all the difference.

As a parent you cannot be expected to know all subject areas and every piece of curriculum knowledge and luckily you don't have to.

Promoting a positive working ethos and encouraging your child to do their very best is essential!





Revision Misconceptions (What your child may tell you!)

"It's too early to start yet." – effective revision starts early and continues at a steady pace. All subject teachers have already started embedding revision into their lessons.

"My friends haven't started revising yet." – They have, they just haven't told you. Surprisingly, these are the same friends who also seem to achieve well 'without revision'

"You can't revise for this subject." – You can and you should! There is always something you can be doing, and at Bydales we optimise the use of Google Classroom and other programmes to ensure our students have access to revision materials.

"I can revise and do other things at the same time." – Certainly not! Concentration is key. There is significant evidence that shows texting, ,watching TV and sometimes listening to music can reduce your levels of concentration by a huge margin, preventing students from being able to retain the information even if they are revising.



How can I support my child with their revision?

Set out a **designated place** at home where your child can complete revision, the kitchen table, a desk in the spare room. Having a set place to separate work from home is really important for balance.

Encourage students to **take a break** every 20-30 minutes to do something fun, or just take a break from writing or the computer. After long periods of time without breaks, we become less productive

Ask them to **set intentions** for each session: 'By the end of this session I will be able to answer questions about photosynthesis'. After the session, you can then have a discussion around what they have learned, to promote that recap and recall.

Ask the student to **create flashcards** on questions they may be asked on their exam, and work with them to create quizzes where you can test their knowledge.



Students First WOOD Do's & Don'ts!

Do!

Provide resources (paper, coloured pens, & snacks!)

'Study Buddy' - Show an interest in their work, get them to be the teacher and teach you!

Chunk information - help your child to break tasks down so they are manageable, create a plan or timetable of how much time they want to spend on each topic area.

Set rules - agree the rules for homework or revision. Implement rewards when targets are met.

Don't

Make comparisons with other students

Make them to revise in a set style or structure, mind maps, post it notes and Google Classroom are still forms of revision.

Require students to evidence all the revision they are doing.

For 'A Christmas Carol' and the poems, students also need to be aware of the context.







How can you help?

- Encourage your child to re-read the texts at home. They have all been provided with their own copies and all of our set texts are available as free PDFs online.
- Quiz your child and encourage discussion about the texts (perhaps you could read them too).
- Watch faithful adaptations of the texts to facilitate discussion around plot and character.







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Students should have a revision task set as homework by their core English teachers each week. We expect them to spend around an hour on these tasks. (I hour 15 for students who are eligible for extra time.) Please encourage your child to complete this work to a high standard.

Encourage your child to speak to their core teachers (or me) if they are confused about the task or need an extension.

There is a homework drop in every Friday from 2.30 pm in room 210.








English Language

3 papers - Pearson Edexcel

Maths revision

- Any topic can appear on any of the 3 papers there are no set topics for each paper
 Therefore we have to ensure that the whole specification has been revised as we do not know what will appear.
- Preparation for assessments is the same as we would prepare for the "real thing".
 First assessments are 2nd week in November 3 papers
- Holiday homework packs will be given out each Holiday (including this half term) to help your child gain further practice in answering exam questions and exam technique
- Your child has been preparing in the lessons with completing an practice paper each week. They have then been given a QLA sheet linking these questions to Sparx so they know what they need to go away and practice. This will also happen after their November assessments



Maths revision

Completing Sparx homework each week is incredible effective for supporting revision as it provides continual practice on the topics they are doing in lesson and also consolidation of past topics covered. It also exposes student to vast amounts of different questions

Students also have to remember facts and formulae these can be found in

- Their school planner a currently underused resource, has lots of important information they need to remember for their maths GCSE
- Revision guides these will be given out in the coming months
- Google classroom we will be placing information on there that is also needed for revision
- Ogat Maths revision website

Students First Maths - extra support we provide

Tutor maths - Students are placed with either the HOD or the 2nd in dept to complete maths skills in tutor time

Flash cards, highlighting information etc helps with remembering facts and formulae

BUT this will not answer a maths question in its entirety, this comes from actually doing the maths and lots of variety of questions

There are many "unique questions" which now appear on the papers each year Students have to gain the confidence to tackle questions they have not seen before by knowing how to apply their knowledge.
